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

Health Beat:

Back to School Tips for Student Mental Health

Students are returning to school this fall which can trigger a variety of reactions, ranging from excitement, anxiety, or feeling a lack from freedom after summer break. Students may experience an increase in their overall stress and anxiety at the start of the new school year. According to the National Survey of Children's Mental Health, anxiety is the most common mental health concern for children ages 3-17. Some ways that families can prioritize mental well-being include:

- Keeping communication lines open to better understand how your student is feeling
- Getting the recommended amount of sleep on a regular basis so that students can better attend in class, manage their emotions and behaviors, and learn/remember academic lessons
- · Staying organized and on a predictable schedule
- Building a support network of family or friends outside of school as well as a go-to adult in the school setting to assist as needed

If you notice that your student may be showing signs of depression or feeling alone, becomes easily agitated, engages in increasingly risky behaviors, is struggling with keeping healthy sleeping patterns, or is showing significant changes in their behavior, it is important to reach out to a mental health professional as well as your school counselor or social worker to identify resources to help support you student's mental well-being.






Classroom Corner

A new school year is upon us even though the weather says it's still summer. Every day is a new adventure in Illinois weather, just like in our school. We began the school year as Walsh Academy on August 17, and our students seem eager to return to see what this year will bring, in addition to a new school building at some point this fall. Looking at a few of the classrooms at Walsh Academy, Ms. Lutz's class is reading The Book Thief and learning about the Great Depression in history. In their consumer math class, they're covering how to calculate total pay and overtime with hourly wages, which many of her students earn at their after-school jobs. In Ms. Parker's class, students are doing an 'All About Me' presentation and studying the history of the US Constitution. For their math class, the students are discovering how to find the midpoint of a line segment and managing a budget with fixed and variable expenses. Mr. Trerotola started the year by having his students reflect on heroes in their lives and what qualities make a hero. This became a pre-reading activity for their new book, Freak the Mighty. Still looking at heroes, Mr. T's students started reading in U.S. history about what led up to the Civil War and the roll out of the first confrontation. Their algebra class started off the year by identifying pertinent information to solve logic matrix word problems. That should clear out some of last year's cobwebs! And Mr. Justin's class is currently learning about the similarities and differences in physical and human geography between Canada and the U.S., learning how to solve for variables in equations in math, and doing a 3D printing project for fine arts. For just the first 2 weeks of school, it seems as though Walsh Academy is in full-tilt boogie mode.


